SUPPORTING RESEARCH

Stray or roaming cats and dogs pose a threat to pets, wildlife and humans. They can spread disease because they are usually poorly cared for. They kill wildlife because they are hungry. They are a nuisance getting into trash, hanging around businesses and homes, and defecating and spraying in the areas in which they roam. The failure to spay and neuter animals is the biggest contributor to the number of unwanted animals that overpopulate animal shelters. Pet owners living in poverty are a demographic that is likely unfamiliar with the benefits of spay/neuter for their animals and may not have the financial means to seek out and pay for medical care for their pets.

Experts agree that only by spaying and neutering companion animals will we get a handle on pet overpopulation and eliminate the need to euthanize adoptable pets.
