GIRLS ON THE RUN CHANGES LIVES.

Girls On the Run of Dayton (GOTR), a non-profit organization that inspires girls in the third through eighth grades to be joyful, healthy and confident, uses a fun experience-based curriculum that creatively integrates running. The girls do much more than train for a 5K. In addition to physical strength, they develop social and emotional skills needed for a healthy lifestyle, such as effective decision-making.

The Women's Partnership Funds was actively involved in bringing GOTR to Clark County, awarding our first of several GOTR-related grants to the Lagonda Elementary program in 2014, which included eight girls. By 2020, the Clark County program had grown to 157 girls, from all of the Springfield City and some county schools. Programs were halted with the onset of Covid and resulting restrictions in after school activities. This spring, two programs are active in Clark County, Catholic Central and Northwestern totaling 40 girls. Planning is underway for the 2022-2023 season for Springfield City and county schools.

Families and Schools Together (FAST), offered through WellSpring by Ramona Henry

Like Girls on The Run, Families and Schools Together (FAST) is a school-based, family-centered program that has been present in our community for over two decade. Designed to foster self-esteem in children, the program works collaboratively with other community organizations to strengthen protective factors against school failure, violence, delinquency and substance abuse. The key to any successful program is its people. For FAST, Ramona Henry is that key.

Ramona became involved with the FAST program at its inception in 1999 as a liaison for Springfield City Schools. She later joined WellSpring and the FAST program as its primary director. Ramona describes herself as "all about the FAST families" and is committed to better outcomes for the children.

Richele Shepard, Executive Director of WellSpring, states Ramona is "the whole package, living a life of

giving to others. When a FAST child or family has an emergency need, Ramona is there, regardless of hour of the day or day of the week. She makes their lives better by giving them the skills to make better decisions and sets an example of how to do it."

Despite her busy professional life, Ramona still finds time for her church, mentoring for the School of Innovation and enjoying the company of family and friends.

Thank you, Ramona and WellSpring, for providing this essential effective program to our youth!




